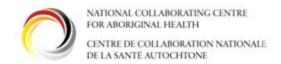

PATH Case Study

- Keppoch-Beaver Mountain Project (KBMP)
- Four-season recreation project in rural northeastern Nova Scotia
 - Nordic and alpine skiing
 - hiking, nature walks, etc.
- \$27 million
 - "Summit Centre" at top of mountain
 - parking for 400
 - new roads, etc.

- KBM project sponsored by municipal government (Antigonish County)
- Significant citizen opposition due to cost, expropriation of land, disruption of rural life
- Significant citizen support due to health benefits, tourism, jobs, etc.

- Enter community health impact assessment!
- Proposed by both citizens and the District Health Authority
- Used CHIA Tool (CHIAT) developed by the local Community Health Board in 2002
- Process overseen by Antigonish Regional Development Authority working with PATH Network

- 14 citizens (one from each of 10 electoral districts plus 4 to balance)
- Commitment to 6 hours over two nights
- Facilitated by PATH Network members
- Report prepared by PATH Network members

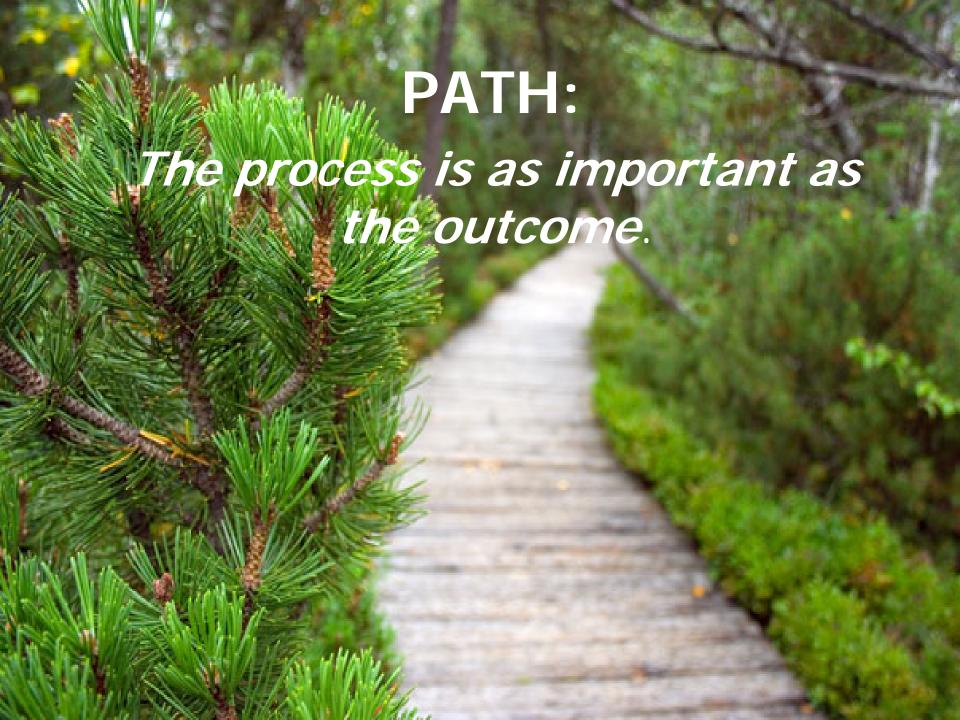

The end of the story:

- Council received the report
- 3 months later, announced there would be no expropriation of land
- 8 months later, announced that project was being cancelled due to lack of community support and funding issues
